# Improving the Quality of Health Care

#### Improving the Quality of Health Care for the Residents of Southwest Saskatchewan

It was a busy year for the Foundation with most of our time and energy being directed toward THE CAMPAIGN. However some of the equipment has been purchased early and put into use in the Diagnostic Imaging department at the existing Hospital. The CR Digitizer Multiplate Reader and CR Single Plate Reader with all accessories were received on January 12, 2007 and will go through its Herbert Credit Union and the Herbert Chamber of Commerce. necessary applications training before use. Their purpose is to convert analog to digital images and will provide the capabilities of using leading edge technology in the new hospital.

A GE VIVID 7 Cardiac Ultrasound machine with Echo Pacs system was also purchased and received in December 2006. This unit will become operational in the new Regional Hospital and will go through the necessary applications training during the initial move. Until then, the unit will be placed in storage.

The Foundation also, took part in raising funds to purchase equipment and furnishing for Herbert's new Integrated Facility. This initiative was headed up by Foundation Board member & Herbert resident Bill Redekop. The funds raised were used to purchase a communications system, a fridge temperature monitoring system, view boxes for Diagnostic Imaging, medical gas adaptors and other furnishings. The Skills Enrichment Scholarship Program was created in 2002 and awards up to \$45,000.00 in scholarships annually. Funded by the Lee/Irwin Endowment and Dr. Moola Award, the scholarships provide funding assistance to front line employees of the Cypress Health Region who wish to upgrade skills and further their education thereby improving the quality of health care for the residents of Southwest Saskatchewan.

The Scholarship Committee held a series of meetings during 2006 to revamp the program in a way which will best meet the needs not only of Healthcare workers in the Southwest but southwest residents who require their care.

In June of 2004, the Foundation encouraged a partnership with the Cypress Health Region to support the continuing education of Dr. Suryvanshi, a surgeon employed at the Cypress Regional Hospital. On April 5, 2006, the Foundation in partnership with the Swift Current Rotary Club, unveiled its latest venture in their quest to improve the quality of health care for all residents of Southwest Saskatchewan. This 3,600 sq-foot multipurpose building, located beside the new Hospital at 2051 Saskatchewan Drive, will contain a six bedroom hostel plus house the new offices of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation.

The purpose of the hostel is for rural outpatients and their family member/driver to have a place to stay, if required, while they are receiving treatment at the new Regional Hospital. Equipped with two full washroom facilities - one being handicapped accessible, and a half bath, plus a common living area for reading or watching TV. Complete with a small kitchenette it provides rural residents with the comforts of home.

#### Support Flows In...

Habitat for Healthcare is headed off to a great start with individuals, corporations, groups, organizations and service clubs showing their support in any way they can.

All six bedrooms at the hostel have already been named & a group is currently considering naming the common living area. The Sunshine Club presented a \$4,300 cheque, as well as a commitment to providing the hostel with a refreshment basket every month to welcome rural residents, during the Foundation's 2006 Annual General Meeting.

# Financial Report

#### Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors
Of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc. as at December 31, 2006 and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation board. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Foundation derives revenue from donations and fund-raising conducted by itself and other organizations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Foundation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fund-raising revenues, surplus for the year, assets and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the fund-raising referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as at December 31, 2006 and the results of its operations and the changes in cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

# DR. NOBLE IRWIN REGIONAL HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2006

#### 1. Operations

The purpose of the Foundation is to raise, administer and disburse funds to improve the quality of health care for the people of Southwest Saskatchewan. The Foundation was incorporated under the Non-profit Corporation Act of Saskatchewan on October 31, 1998.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The more significant accounting policies are as follows:

- (a) Fund accounting: The accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. For financial reporting purposes, accounts with similar characteristics have been combined into the following major funding groups:
- Operating fund: The operating fund reflects the revenue and expenses related to achieving the mission of the Foundation including administrative expenses, unrestricted donations, and unrestricted contributions.
- ii) Restricted fund: The restricted fund reflects revenues that are designated for specific purposes by the contributor and the related expenses.
- iii) Endowment fund: The endowment fund reflects permanent contributions. The income on the endowment fund is recorded in the restricted fund and is to be used for restricted purposes.
- (b) Revenue recognition: The Foundation follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions as follows:

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the period it is received or receivable. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

- (c) Inventory: Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.
- (d) Investments: Investments are valued at the lower of cost and market value, unless the decline in market value is deemed temporary in nature by management.
- (e) Capital assets: Capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized on a declining basis as follows:

Displays 20% Office equipment 20%

(f) Contributed services and goods: The operations of the Foundation utilize services of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased, and because of the difficulty in determining the fair market value of donated services, the value of these donated services is not recognized in the financial statements. Also, due to the difficulty in determining the fair market value of all donated goods, these goods have not been recognized in the financial statements.

(g) Income taxes: The Foundation is a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act and is; therefore, exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1) of the Act.

#### 3. Inventor

Inventory is comprised of fundraising supplies, communication supplies and office supplies.
