The Skills Enrichment Scholarship Program was created in 2002 and awards scholarships annually. Funded by the Lee/Irwin Endowment and Dr. Moola Award, the scholarships provide funding assistance to front line employees of Cypress Health Region who wish to upgrade their skills and further their education thereby improving the quality of health care for the residents of Southwest Saskatchewan.

Scholarships paid out to date: \$168,758.33

Ten Year Reflection 1999-2009

"As a result of a study commissioned by the Swift Current Health District the Foundation Board was formed in the fall of 1998. The board consists of community and regional volunteers whose vision is to develop our health care facilities into an enhanced regional centre of health care excellence for the citizens of Southwest Saskatchewan."

The Foundation, wrote Scott Anderson in The City Sun March 31, 1999 (page 5), "...will initially begin investigation for capital projects in the Swift Current Health District, and in the next few weeks expand the search to include Rolling Hills and South West Health Districts." Eight community volunteers were on the founding board of directors. Joan Meyer- Chairperson, Tim Keene- Vice-Chairperson, Ted Poppitt secretary-treasurer, Colleen MacBean, Dr. Mal- Day and, the list continued to grow. colm Banks, Ron Heeg, Dave Parenteau and John Penner. "Our Board is convinced that by working together for the enrichment of our healthcare, we will all be the beneficiaries and Southwest Saskatchewan will once again take gional Healthcare Foundation Inc. to more acits role as a leader in rural healthcare." - Joan Meyer

The first fundraising events of the Foundation were the 24-hour Community Relay & the Festival of Trees, in partnership with the Art Gallery of Swift Current the proceeds going to the purchase of ventilators and radiant baby warmers. Partnerships with the employees of SaskTel, through Telecare; Early campaigns "Honoring Our Heritage"- meeting the needs of long-term care facilities; friendships were created: Old-Timers Hockey Challenge; The City of Swift Current Sunshine Club; Night Out in Greece, "No Place Like Home" & "We Believe in Angels" funds were designated for the development of a Dialysis Unit at the Swift Current Regional Hospital. A Wander-Guard system was installed in Gull Lake Special Care Centre; Bob L'Heureux Charity Golf Classic, Swift Current Firefighters, W.W. Smith Insurance & Travel; Wheatland Mall merchants; SGI; Dooly's Billards & Lounge; the Palliser Social Club and the Swift Current Rotary Club.

Many wonderful things have transpired since those early days: "The True Picture of Health-Beef Up Your Health" and the generous donation from the estate of Mr. Hugh Swann Allen (Brachen, SK.); Cargill Animal Nutrition; Rotary Club of Swift Current Lobster Night; Christmas TV Auction; Myers Norris Penny Charity have been awarded to people from every area Golf Classic; The Royal Canadian Legion Branch #56 Poppy Drive. The first eighteen months saw purchases and commitments from the Foundation total more than \$1,112,200.00.

In November 2001 the 3rd Annual "We Believe in Angels" Campaign began asking the citizens most. of the Southwest region to join with The Foundation in the fight against breast cancer by supporting the purchase of a new mammography unit/suite; with a significant personal contribution from Louise Lee along

with corporate sponsors: CIBC, Southwest Credit Union, Greek Orthodox Community, Cargill Animal Nutrition, and W.W. Smith Insurance & Travel.

The Foundation commissioned a "Feasibility Study" to determine the needs of the people of the Southwest Region providing both direction and inspiration as the Foundation plotted a new course for the years ahead. The Lee/Irwin Educational Endowment was announced; "A-Mazing Family Weekend"; Cypress Region Lions Hospital Lottery Draw, Mothers High Tea, Grower Direct Friendship

In 2003 the Foundation, after a unanimous decision by the Board, announced a name change to the Dr. Noble Irwin Recurately reflect the area of focus. Group Medical Services announced a \$100,000.00 donation to "Have a Healthy Heart" campaign.

THE Campaign Senate announced a 7.5 million dollar campaign in April 2005 towards the building of the new Cypress Regional Hospital.

Mr. Jack Wiebe, CAMPAIGN senator expressed his pleasure at being part of Towards Healthcare Excellence (THE) CAMPAIGN, "I think the part of THE CAMPAIGN that I have enjoyed the most was the wonderful stories. Each donation whether it was from a corporation, small business, service club or an individual-each gift had a beautiful story to tell. [Donors] wanted to say thank you to the community. How important health care was to their families. How they wanted to remember a loved one and how they wanted to share their good fortune with their community. It speaks volumes to the character, the generosity, and the spirit of the southwest community in which we have the good fortune to live."

Today equipment has been purchased for every facility in the Region and scholarships in the region with more items currently approved. Your donations are going towards improving the quality of your healthcare and make each facility the best of its kind in the province.

Financial Report

Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation Inc. as at December 31, 2008 and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation board. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Foundation derives revenue from donations and fund-raising conducted by itself and other organizations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Foundation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fund-raising revenues, surplus for the year, assets and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the fund-raising referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as at December 31, 2008 and the results of its operations and the changes in cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

DR. NOBLE IRWIN REGIONAL HEALTHCARE FOUNDATION INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2008

1. Operations

The purpose of the Foundation is to raise, administer and disburse funds to improve the quality of health care for the people of Southwest Saskatchewan. The Foundation was incorporated under the Non-profit Corporation Act of Saskatchewan on October 31, 1998.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The more significant accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Fund accounting

The accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. For financial reporting purposes, accounts with similar characteristics have been $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left$ combined into the following major funding groups:

i) Operating fund

The operating fund reflects the revenue and expenses related to achieving the mission of the Foundation including administrative expenses, unrestricted donations, and unrestricted contributions.

ii) Restricted fund

The restricted fund reflects revenues that are designated for specific purposes by the contributor and the related expenses.

iii) Endowment fund

The endowment fund reflects permanent contributions. The income on the endowment fund is recorded in the restricted fund and is to be used for restricted purposes.

(b) Revenue recognition

The Foundation follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions as follows:

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the period it is received or receivable. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(c) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

(d) Investments

All investments are classified as held-for-trading. The fair market value of the held-for-trading investments was determined by reference to quoted market prices.

(e) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized on a declining basis as follows:

Displays	20%
Office equipment	20%
Buildings	4%

(f) Contributed services and goods

The operations of the Foundation utilize services of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased, and because of the difficulty in determining the fair market value of donated services, the value of these donated services is not recognized in the financial statements, except as they relate to the construction of the habitat for healthcare facility.

The Foundation is a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act and is; therefore, exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1) of the Act.

Inventory is comprised of fundraising supplies, communication supplies, office supplies and gift shop inventory for resale.

The Foundation's objectives, when managing capital, are to safeguard its ability to continue as a notfor-profit organization in an effort to carry out its mission. Capital consists of fund balances including restricted funds. The Foundation is subject to externally imposed restrictions relating to restricted funds, including endowments.
