The Foundation has also committed to fund a \$500 scholarship for the nursing program at Cypress Hills Regional College, Beatty Campus in 2001.

Accomplishments

Our FIRST FULL YEAR of operation proved to be an extremely busy and successful one. Support for the Foundation began early in the year. Commitments from the Swift Current Rotary Club which pledged \$15,000 to, "Honoring Our Heritage," a campaign to raise funds for the needs of long term care, and the presentation of the Dooly's/Rotary Corporate Challenge got things underway. This first time event garnered both financial and in kind donations from fifty-three businesses and had fifty-four teams entered. The event raised over \$5,800.

Dollars for Dialysis was the main campaign of the first quarter of the year and was used to raise funds in order to meet our commitment of purchasing five dialysis machines for the new hemodialysis unit at the Swift Current Regional Hospital. Response was overwhelming. Significant donations from the Saskatchewan Pharmaceutical Association, The Lehrerleut Hutterian Colonies, Martha Rapson, The community of Hodgeville, Mr. & Mrs. Clarence Wall, Renaissance Energy and the Pennant Lions were among many that quickly provided the funds to meet our commitment. The campaign was completed with the spring dedication for the new unit.

At the same time The Foundation purchased a badly needed portable ventilator for ICU. This equipment was required to meet the needs of patients having to be transported to other centres for treatment.

Funds came in from some unique sources. There was nothing fishy about the \$4,400 raised by the Rotary Club with a Lobster Feed. The committee provided one of the best evenings of food and entertainment enjoyed in the city all year. The Swift Current Lions Club collected a record amount of donations during the exhibition parade and contributed over \$1500 from their "Barrel" to the Foundation.

While the volunteer committee prepared for the 2nd Annual Community Relay for Health Care the folks at MeyersNorrisPenney were gearing up for their first Charity Golf Tournament in support of the Foundation.

The Relay sponsored by SaskEnergy, Shaw and fifteen new promotion sponsors netted over \$25,800, more than double the net proceeds of year one. The Xray Walkers took top prize while Bert LeGault won the West Jet Trip for most funds raised by an individual. The committee, under the chairmanship of Esther Wall, is to be congratulated for an outstanding effort.

One of the best days on record for golf had to be September 15th. The weather was unseasonably bright and warm, the event boasted the richest prize package available at any Swift

Current Charity tournament and there was a scrumptious steak dinner awaiting all team members at the completion of the tournament. Over \$13,000 was raised in the first Annual MeyersNorrisPenny Par 3 Charity Golf classic to benefit the work of the Foundation.

In October the Foundation announced its most ambitious campaign to date. The 1.8 million dollar, "True Picture of Health," campaign is to be carried out over a three year period and is supported by projects like "Beef up Your Health". The campaign was officially started with a bequest from the estate of Mr. Hugh Swan Allen in the amount of \$600,000 and efforts to upgrade and purchase new equipment for the Diagnostic Imaging Department were underway.

Other announcements included the beginning of a 50/50 Share for Health Lottery, with monthly draws, the proceeds of which would be directed toward equipment purchases and the addition of the 1st Annual Christmas Television Auction to augment our Annual Campaign.

While individuals from rural communities in the southwest and the City of Swift Current committed donations of calves, grain and cash to Beef Up Your Health, Stark & Marsh took on the role of major sponsor for the first year of the project. In less than three months the Foundation was wintering a pen of 33 calves. Of special note was the contribution of the Grubb brothers of Gull Lake who, as a result of their auction donation and appeal for support, generated over \$2,600 for the project. The Beef Up Your Health Committee, chaired by Glen Rittinger and lead by advisor/committee member Gordie Cameron, are to be commended for laying the groundwork for another very successful program.

The Greek Orthodox Community of Swift Current once again provided one of the most entertaining and enjoyable evenings of the year at the 2nd Annual Night Out in Greece. The event raised thousands of dollars for two pieces of equipment that topped the needs list of the hospital nursery. The evening, another sell out, will long be remembered for the fine food and entertainment which folks have come to associate with this annual event. As one of the major contributors to the Foundation, the Greek Community and their efforts continue to be an inspiration to the Foundation volunteers.

As part of our "We Believe in Angels"
Campaign the Foundation undertook the 1st
Annual Christmas Television Auction. 250
items were on the block and generated over
\$15,000. The Southwest Credit Union, Shaw
and SaskTel were joined by ten block sponsors
and over one hundred and fifty merchandise
donors who ensured the success of this effort.

The support of volunteers from the Southwest Credit Union employees, SaskTel employees, the Shriners, and Shaw, as well as committee recruited volunteers, combined efforts to make this undertaking one to grow on. John Penner and the Auction committee are to be congratulated on a job well done.

The continued contributions of groups like the Royal Canadian Legion, TelCare, and the Southwest Credit Union employees were augmented by several In Memorial funds and an increasing number of individual donations. Such support resulted in total commitments to equipment purchases, within the year, that surpassed \$1,000,000.

The investment made by urban and rural residents and businesses to improving the quality of healthcare for the people for he Southwest has been heartwarming to say the least. The Foundation has, with your support, been able to purchase sixteen new pieces of equipment to add to the six pieces purchases in 1999. All of the equipment was badly needed and lacked any other source of available funding. The benefits were immediately evident and assisted with improving the quality of health care in the acute and long term care facilities in the regional centre.

Your investment in The Dr. Noble Healthcare Foundation has continued to pay significant dividends to all those in need of care.

We wish to thank each and every donor, no matter the vehicle used or size of donation made, for their support, and for making 2000 a very significant year in our development.

The Foundation would also like to express their sincere appreciation to the media for their continuing covereage and promotion of our programs, progress and events.

Financial

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of the Dr. Noble Irwin Health Care Foundation Inc.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Dr. Noble Irwin Health Care Foundation Inc. as at December 31, 2000 and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation board. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the Foundation derives revenue from donations and fund-raising conducted by itself and other organizations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Foundation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fund-raising revenues, excess of receipts over disbursements, assets and fund surpluses.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the fundraising referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as at December 31, 2000 and the results of its operations and the changes in cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2000

1. Operations

The purpose of the Foundation is to raise, administer and disburse funds to improve the quality of health care for the people of Southwest Saskatchewan. The Foundation was incorporated under the Non-profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan on October 31, 1998.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The more significant accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. For financial reporting purposes, accounts with similar characteristics have been combined into the following major funding groups.

i) Operating fund

The operating fund reflects the revenue and expenses related to achieving the mission of the Foundation including administrative expenses, unrestricted donations, and unrestricted contributions.

ii) Restricted fund

The restricted fund reflects revenues that are designated for specific purposes by the contributor and the related expenses.

b) Revenue recognition

The Foundation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions as follows:

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as the revenue of the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

c) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

d) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized on a declining basis as follows:

e) Contributed services and goods

The operations of the Foundation utilize services of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased, and because of difficulty in determining the fair market value of donated services, the value of these donated services is not recognized in the financial statements. Also due to the difficulty in determining the fair market value of all donated goods these goods have not been recognized in the financial statements.

f) Income taxes

The Foundation is a registered charity withing the meaning of the Income Tax Act and is therefore exempt from income taxes under Section 149(1) of the Act.

3. Donations receivable

The donations receivable that are to be received in 2000 total \$658,025. The donations to be received after 2000 are as follows:

6. Internally restricted operating fund

The Foundation has restricted use of \$100,000 of the surplus to build a reserve whose purpose will be to use only the interest earned on it for contributions.

- Currently the funds raised by the Foundation are primarily directed toward the purchase of equipment.
- The Foundation receives no government funding.
- Foundation Board members are volunteers and receive no remuneration for their service.
- All donations, bequests and in kind gifts for acute or long-term care and home care services are accepted by the Foundation.
- All donations may be designated toward any Swift Current health care facility, service or department or may be made in support of the Foundation's endowment, equipment or general funds.
- The Foundation will NOT raise funds for any project or portion of a project which is eligible for Government funding or to replace funds that are available for any project through the budget of the Swift Current Health District.
