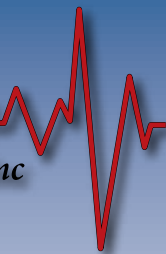

- November 30 for courses/classes scheduled to begin January 1 through June 30.

Applicants must be enrolled and/or will be enrolling in the program, course or classes scheduled to begin within the six month period following the SESP submission deadline date and be prepared to sign a Return For Service Agreement upon the conclusion of studies.

A NEW CT SCANNER

2013 was a big year for the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation. It was determined that the Cypress Health Region required a new CT Scanner. The \$1.6 million price tag meant that all our efforts would be needed to raise the funds necessary to purchase this outstanding state-of-the-art piece of equipment. It was going to be a very big year and frankly, we were not sure we could make it happen in only one year.

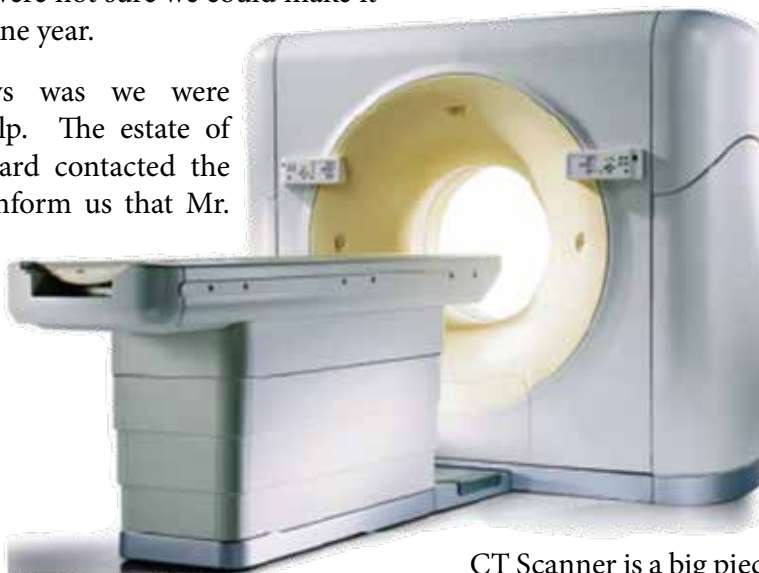
The good news was we were about to get help. The estate of Mr. Roy Blanchard contacted the Foundation to inform us that Mr. Blanchard had made a bequest to healthcare as part of his estate planning. The Foundation would be receiving \$1.2 million dollars, which could be used to help with the cost of the new CT Scanner. This generous 'planned gift' made it possible for the Foundation to raise the money to complete this very necessary purchase in just one year.

While this unexpected Planned Gift provided the majority of the funding needed, our Annual 28 hour Radiothon on CKSW 570 AM gathered

an additional \$143,544 and our fundraising Golf Classic contributed some \$15,000 toward the overall cause.

Essentially you, our donors, made this purchase possible. Through all manner and all levels of contributions, you made this state-of-the-art equipment purchase a reality. You made an improvement to healthcare in southwest Saskatchewan; you improved treatment, and you made it possible for our healthcare providers to save lives. We sincerely appreciate everybody's willingness to participate in our 2013 projects and goals.

While the new CT Scanner is a big piece of the health care puzzle, it is only one piece. Please keep the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation in mind when planning your charitable giving. MEGAN'S STORY

My diagnosis of cancer came on the appropriately cold day of February 24, 2011. I was 26, worried about a sore on my tongue that wasn't going away, and sitting in my doctor's chair. He spoke 2 chilling words: 'It's cancer' and my thoughts immediately went to my 6 month old daughter and her future. Within a week, I was being prepped for surgery that would ultimately result in me living without 2/3rds of my tongue. Healing after such a procedure was incredibly difficult, and, though I live near Saskatoon, I spent a month recovering in Swift Current at my parents' house with the loving support of my family. In my heart, this community will always be my home.

In May I began to notice severe swelling in my neck, I knew something was wrong. I had just returned to Saskatoon, and recent ultrasound results came back 'abnormal'. Further diagnostic imaging needed to be done, and the earliest I could get in for a CT scan in Saskatoon was May 19th. When I phoned my parents to give them the update, I couldn't come to terms with the potential reality of my cancer being back. They convinced me not to take any more chances with my health, and recommended that I put forth a requisition form at the hospital in Swift Current. Thankfully, I was able to get in on May 10th.

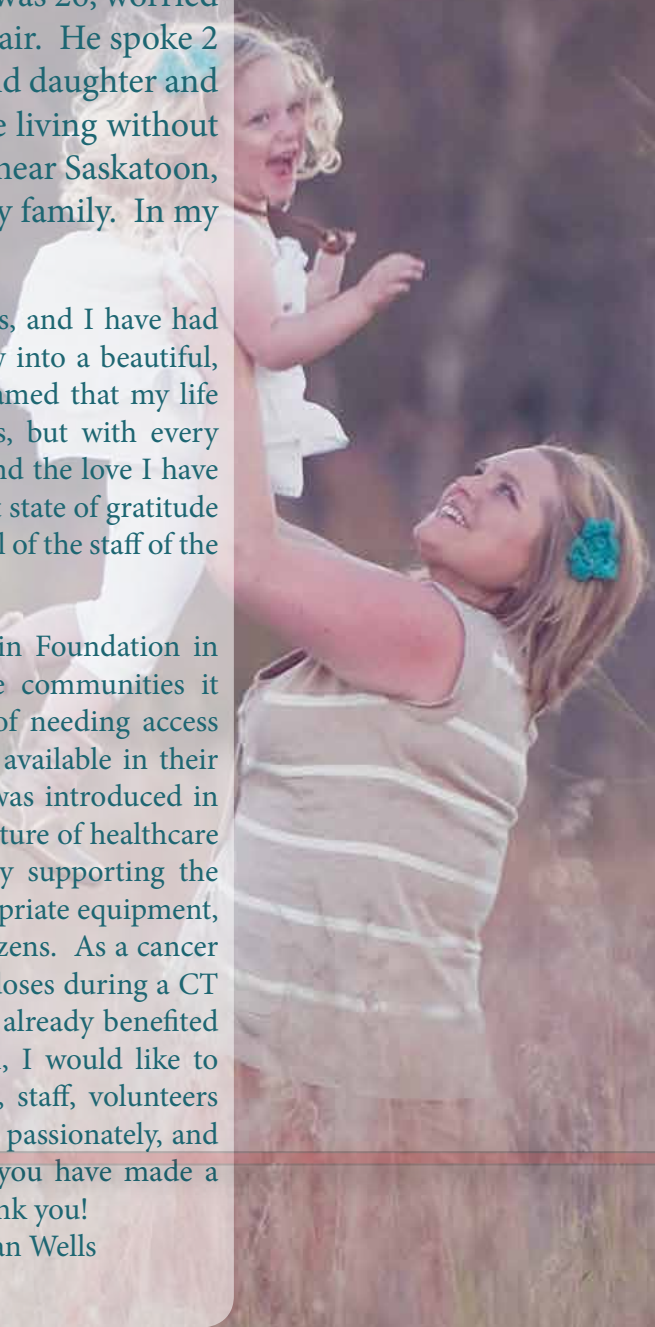
The next day, it was confirmed that the swelling in my lymph nodes was indeed cancer. So advanced, we learned later, that it was classified as Stage IV b- I literally couldn't have been closer to having a terminal diagnosis. Being able to have a CT scan done in Swift Current didn't just shave off 9 days in being diagnosed. My surgeon was away after my original CT scan appointment date, so what it meant for me was that I had surgery at least 2 weeks sooner than if I had waited to have a scan in Saskatoon. The type of cancer I have is extremely aggressive; I believe having the diagnosis sooner led to a better chance of me surviving. It was a potentially life-saving opportunity.

I began chemotherapy and radiation treatments that June and spent many months recovering in Swift Current. My cancer

has been in remission for 2 and a half years, and I have had the privilege of watching my daughter grow into a beautiful, bright young girl. I would never have dreamed that my life could move on from that cancer diagnosis, but with every passing day, I grow stronger. The support and the love I have received are so humbling; I live in a constant state of gratitude to the community of Swift Current and for all of the staff of the Cypress Health Region.

I applaud the efforts of the Dr. Noble Irwin Foundation in bringing state-of-the-art equipment to the communities it serves. When people are in the position of needing access to diagnostic imaging, it is ideal to have it available in their community. The newest CT scanner that was introduced in Swift Current last year means a lot for the future of healthcare in South-West Saskatchewan. Not only by supporting the vital work that staff do by giving them appropriate equipment, but also in providing safer outcomes for citizens. As a cancer survivor, being exposed to lower radiation doses during a CT scan means a lot to me personally. Having already benefited from the amazing work of the Foundation, I would like to extend my personal thanks to their Board, staff, volunteers and supporters. I know you work hard and passionately, and you may never know the extent to which you have made a difference: from the bottom of my heart, thank you!

Ben Nesbitt recently transferred to Swift Current with his family. They were immediately happy with their decision. Ben in particular was overwhelmed with the quality of healthcare available.

Ben had been diagnosed with cancer in 2008 and again in 2012. Both times radical surgery was necessary. Along with the surgery, Ben chose to have regular periodic CT scans to allow his doctors to keep a close eye on any potential spread of the cancer, and allowing him to sidestep radiation therapy. Moving from Calgary to Swift Current, Ben had his concerns:

“My primary oncology care has been done in Calgary, whose metropolitan status affords great healthcare options including variety, funding, and technology. As Swift Current became our new home, I was skeptical on the level of healthcare I would receive in a small city. Since the move, Alberta Health and Saskatchewan Health have ensured no CT scans have been missed. Swift Current’s hospital has proven to be as friendly, convenient, and advanced as anything I have experienced in Alberta.

In particular, the CT scanner in Swift Current appears to be newer and more advanced than the CT scanners I experienced in Calgary. I know cutting edge technology is important for medical treatment, and I feel fortunate to have access to our community’s CT scanner. Swift Current’s hospital has allowed me to continue my prescribed healthcare with no interruptions. Happily, I remain healthy.

We are so pleased to have been moved here as a family, and we are thankful for the community and all it has to offer.”

The CT Scanner is important in the treatment of Cancer, but how else can it be used? We asked Dr. Jason Gatzke; regional director, emergency medicine, to outline for us some of the emergency room applications where the CT Scanner can be used.

“In the case of trauma such as a car accident, we can use the new scanner to check for a skull fracture, bruising/bleeding over the brain, spine fractures, a collapsed lung or bleeding in the chest, abdomen, or pelvis. These injuries can be life threatening and require immediate treatment.

Another common CT Scanner use in the emergency department is diagnosing pulmonary emboli, or blood clots in the lungs. This can happen at any age, and the symptoms are often vague. The scan takes merely seconds to do and can provide an answer right away. Treatment with blood thinners is life saving and needs to be started immediately. Undiagnosed and

untreated, pulmonary emboli can lead to death within a few days. My own brother came into the ER experiencing shortness of breath. The new CT Scanner found that his lungs were full of clots, and treatment saved his life.

The new CT Scanner also gives us new options in improving stroke care. Not only can we do a scan of the brain to see the stroke, but also an angiogram, (a picture of the carotid arteries in the neck), to see if there is a blockage. Immediately, our team of radiology, internal medicine, and emergency physicians, along with the stroke neurologist in Saskatoon or Regina, will be able to look at the images. We can then decide on

an immediate treatment plan in the critical minutes and hours after a stroke happens.”

A NIGHT OUT IN GREECE

Over the years, our dedicated members from fifteen families have not only worked hard to maintain our Church, but also to support community groups through various fundraising donations.

Our proudest achievement is that of our "Annual Night Out in Greece" held each October. Over the past 15 years, the event has raised over \$700,000 for the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation. These funds have assisted in purchasing critical medical equipment for the Cypress Regional Hospital in Swift Current.

Our first Night Out in Greece was in 1999, when Gus Tsougrianis, George Gannitsos, Louis Tsougrianis, Gus Doulias, Gus Tsougrianis and Steve Koutsogiannis were approached to host a Greek party, and share the Greek traditions and culture with the residents of Swift Current. Funds raised that first year were used by the Dr. Noble Irwin Healthcare Foundation to purchase equipment for renal dialysis. The result

was incredible; people were very enthusiastic about the event and the request was made to host it every year.

It was then that the Greek Orthodox Community decided to make this an annual event, every October to showcase our community and our pride in being Greek, and to show new people every year what it means to be Greek. Every October we 'baptise' newcomers into our great big fat Greek family!

Inviting them to enjoy what we live every day.

Unfortunately, we have lost three of our Greek Night founders to cancer; George Gannitsos, Gus Doulias, and Louie Tsougrianis. It was very difficult for our close knit community, and we struggled to find the devotion our fathers had. Gus Tsougrianis our Community President did his best to keep up the meetings, and make sure we stayed on track. As a result, our second and third generations began to step up and take on bigger

\$100,000 PLUS DONORS

Every dollar raised counts, but when donors reach a new level it's something worth noting. Al and Loretta Romankewicz have achieved just that. The retired couple, a former carpenter and school teacher respectively, have just recently donated to the Foundation in the form of an endowment, which has put them over \$100,000 in accumulated donations. The endowment will be put to use helping with training costs in Dr. Tara Lee's residency program. Loretta Romankewicz knows Dr. Lee and feels that the program is something they should support. *"When I read about Dr. Lee and her plans with the residency and the simulator, I thought wow! And the way she's gone, I mean she's really moving along with it isn't she? So I encouraged my husband, and he agreed."*

The proceeds from the endowment will be put to good use according to Dr. Lee, *"the funds provided by the endowment will be used to bring in a course called PALS (pediatric acute lifesaving course). The residents (doctors) would otherwise have to travel all over Canada to get this course which is a lot of money. Now, we are going to be able to bring the course here on an annual basis to make sure they can all attend. It means they will be more proficient and ready for pediatric emergencies. We highly recommend to all of our residents (doctors) to take many acute lifesaving courses. They do not get funding from the University to go*

We have both worked for our money, now we want our money to work for the good of our friends and neighbours, and our medical community.

It feels good and very satisfactory to know that we will help Dr. Lee's dream of training medical residents grow, and hopefully retaining some of those same residents to practice in the southwest."*

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Chaplaincy Services (Spiritual Healing) provides the opportunity for medical professionals to focus and concentrate on the “physical” side of healing. Studies have shown that Spiritual Care increases the rate of physical recovery; shortens hospital stays and has a positive effect on patient satisfaction as it applies to their in-hospital experience.

The Swift Current and Area Ministerial Association (SCAMA) entered into an agreement with the Cypress Health Region to provide Chaplaincy Services on a “volunteer” basis two years ago. The program has enjoyed tremendous success, recording 584 visits in 2013 plus an additional 230 notifications were forwarded to Churches and spiritual providers, advising them as to the status of their parishioners. At present, the Chaplain has been spending between 10 and 20 hours per week providing this service within the Cypress Regional Hospital.

While SCAMA is to be commended for their commitment to the program, they cannot be expected to continue providing this vital service on a “volunteer” basis and the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Healthcare Foundation has agreed to support their efforts to gather funds to support the Chaplaincy Services Program as it grows and continues into the future.

Reading the summarized financial statements therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of the Dr. Noble Irwin Regional Health Care Foundation Inc.

Management's Responsibility for the Summarized Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of a summary of the audited financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summarized financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standards (CAS) 810, "Engagements to Report on Summary Financial Statements."

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the Foundation derives revenue from donations and fundraising conducted by itself and other organizations, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Foundation and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenues, surplus for the year, assets and fund balances.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the summarized financial statements derived from the audited financial statements of the Dr. Noble Irwin Health Care Foundation Inc. for the year ended December 31, 2013 are a fair summary of those financial statements, in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.


